



CodeRED Emergency Notification System Is Working In the Village of Coal Valley

The Village of Coal Valley is participating in CodeRED® CodeRED is an emergency notification system to help keep you and your family safe in the event of an emergency.

Alerts are sent from your local public safety agency by mobile app, SMS text, email and more. If you are a resident of



the Village of Coal Valley, visit the website at https://coalvalleyil. org or go directly to https://accountportal.onsolve.net/coal-valleyil-alerts to register to receive emergency alerts. Residents and visitors can also download the CodeRED app to receive alerts directly to their Smartphone.

The system delivers emergency messages to your landline as well as to your registered mobile device, text and email. The CodeRED Weather Warning system is an opt-in service that automatically notifies those enrolled of tornado, flash flood, and severe thunderstorm warnings just moments after an alert is issued by the National Weather Service (NWS).


A "call area" will be marked, identifying street addresses.

Telephone numbers will be matched up electronically to these addresses through the use of Geographical Information Systems. A pre-recorded message will be sent out via the telephone with information about the incident and instructions for action to be taken. The message will play when answered by a live person or an answering machine. The system

makes three attempts to connect to each number. If you choose to opt in for text messages and/or email alerts, those will also be sent utilizing a similar process.


So it's not just a sign of our times. Times haven't changed. *Below is a snippet from a newspaper editorial from 1949...*

BURNING

BURNING LEAVES AND OTHER LANDSCAPE WASTE

It shall be lawful to burn dry leaves and/or other dry landscape waste, such as grass, tree limbs, shrub trimmings and other materials accumulated as a result of the care of lawns, shrubbery, vines and trees, in the Village between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Following the foregoing designated burning times, fires resulting from burning leaves and other landscape waste shall be completely extinguished and shall not be allowed to continue to

smolder beyond the designated burning

time.

ATTENDANCE

Burning of leaves and other landscape waste shall be constantly attended by a competent person until the fire is completely extinguished

DEPOSITING AND BURNING LEAVES, OTHER LANDSCAPE WASTE, AND REFUSE ON VILLAGE RIGHT-OF-WAYS, STREETS. AND SIDEWALKS

It shall be unlawful to deposit and/or burn leaves, landscape waste, or refuse on any Village Right-of-Ways, concrete or asphalt surfaced streets or sidewalks in the Village (See also Section 26, Chapter 1 Streets, Division 1 Streets, Title IX, STREETS, PUBLIC WAYS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY).

LOCATION

Burning of leaves and other landscape waste shall take place only on the premises from which such leaves and other landscape waste was derived.

BURNING REFUSE

It shall be unlawful at any time to burn rubbish or trash, including but not limited to waste paper products and garbage, or waste material from construction, demolition or renovation of buildings.

DISPOSAL

It shall be unlawful at any time to dispose any leaf/yard material into any creek, stream, ravine or street.

PARKING PROHIBITED DURING SNOW REMOVAL

It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a vehicle to remain on any Village Street, Avenue, alley, cul de sac or village parking lot within the Village following a snowfall occurrence of two inches or more:

Whenever the Village Administrator, Village President, or Chief of Police, perceives an emergency to exist in the Village; or in any section or sections thereof, because of snow, freezing rain, sleet, ice, snowdrifts or other natural phenomena which create hazardous conditions or impede the free movement of fire, police, health, emergency or other vehicular traffic or otherwise endanger the safety and welfare of the public, the Village Administrator, Village President, or Chief of Police may declare an emergency to exist. Primary notification will be made by sending Notification of Snow Emergency to the local media with a request to broadcast the emergency.

Any agent or employee of the village designated to enforce the parking ordinances of the city is hereby authorized to cause any motor vehicle parked in violation of this section to be towed from any street, alley, cul-de-sac, or village parking lot. In such

a case, the owner of the vehicle may be assessed the cost of towing and any storage charges in relation thereto, subject to the owner's right of appeal to the Village Administrator, Village President, or Chief of Police.



This ordinance applies to all Village streets and roads,

there will be no signs posted about moving vehicles when we have a snow fall of 2 or more inches.

Village reminds parking rules during snow emergencies

The Village of Coal Valley wishes to remind residents of the importance removing snow from sidewalks and proper snow removal from driveways and other areas.

SNOW REMOVAL

All abutting property owners shall be responsible

To remove within a reasonable time from the portion of any public sidewalk abutting said property all snow and ice.

To refrain from putting, pushing, blowing of otherwise depositing any snow removed from a public sidewalk of private property upon any improved public roadway.

For purposes of this Section, "reasonable time" shall mean that snow removal shall be within twenty-four (24) hours after cessation of a snowfall, or, if a snowfall ceases in the nighttime hours, within twenty-four (24) hours after sunrise.

PENALTY.

Any person violating the provisions of this Chapter shall be in accordance with Title I Division V Chapter 1 Section 3 of the Code of Ordinance for the Village of Coal Valley for each offense.



Choosing Your Turkey: A Guide to Buying the Perfect Bird

Are you hosting Thanksgiving or in charge of bringing the turkey? When preparing for a holiday meal, choosing the right turkey is essential. Here's a quick guide to help you decide on size, type, and storage.




- Fresh vs. Frozen Frozen turkeys can be stored for months, so you can purchase one well in advance. Fresh turkeys, however, should only be bought 1–2 days before cooking. If needed, fresh turkeys can also be frozen for up to 12 months.
- Check labels USDA Grade A symbol indicates the highest quality. Pre-basted turkeys contain added broth or spices for flavor, while un-basted turkeys have no added ingredients.
- Hen or Tom Turkey? Hens are generally under 16 pounds and often have more edible meat than larger toms, which are over 16 pounds. However, tenderness depends on the bird's age, not gender.
- Wild and Smoked Turkeys Wild turkeys are leaner due to their active lifestyles and are best cooked using moist heat to avoid
 dryness. Smoked turkeys are fully cooked and only need reheating unless stated otherwise on the label. They can be refrigerated
 for up to a week, but once opened, use them within three to four days.

A Thanksgiving Leftover Recipe by Drue Mielke

- 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) Condensed Cream of Mushroom Soup
- 2 cans (10 1/2 ounces) Campbell's® Condensed Cream of Chicken Soup
- 1 cup milk
- 1 can green peas
- 2 cups turkey
- 18 ounce bags egg noodles (11/2 bags dry noodles, then cooked and drained
- · 2 tablespoons plain dry bread crumbs
- · 2 tablespoons olive oil or butter
- · Pre-heat oven to 375°F.
- · Boil egg noodles until soft but do not overcook.
- Heat soup, milk, peas, turkey in a pan. When heated, pour into large mixing bowl
- Blend in cooked egg noodles and pour into well-greased casserole dish (or casserole dishes depending on size used) When blending, do not break the noodles.
- Stir breadcrumbs and butter/oil in a small, separate bowl.
- Bake the turkey mixture at 375°F for 25 minutes or until hot and bubbling. Sprinkle with the bread crumb mixture.
- Bake for 5 more minutes or until the bread crumb mixture is golden brown.







St. Maria Goretti Church Becomes Merged Parish

On Monday, September 29, 2025 St. Maria Goretti Church, Coal Valley, became a merged parish with the name St. Gabriel the Archangel Parish. The new parish consists as one parish with two church locations; Mary Our Lady of Peace in Orion and St. Maria Goretti Coal Valley site in downtown Coal Valley at 220 E. 22nd Avenue.

St. Maria Goretti's pastor, Fr. Anthony Ego explains "We are one parish with two church locations,". Fr. Ego is pastor at both the Coal Valley and Orion churches.

The Diocese of Peoria restructured 156 parishes to be merged to 75, which included the Coal Valley church. According to Bishop Louis Tylka, the reduction in parishes is due in large part to a declining number of priests. The Diocese currently has 145 active priests, 11 fewer than the number of total parishes in the Diocese. Bishop Tylka said that 70% of current priests are over the age of 50. The Diocese projects to have 100 priests remaining by 2034.

The clergy shortage is being felt across many Christian churches. First Presbyterian Church, 2431 1st Street, Coal Valley, shares its pastor, Pastor Dr. Andrew McDonald, with Buelah Presbyterian in rural Orion, just a few miles south of Coal Valley on Oak Glen Road at 9221 148th Ave., Orion.

Although not due to a clergy shortage, New Hope Baptist Church, 706 1st Street, Coal Valley, has an interim pastor- Pastor Jerry Higdon. Their previous pastor, Pastor Jon Sedgwick, accepted a new calling in Missouri on October 13th of this year. Pastor Sedgwick served as the pastor at New Hope since January 2017.

New Hope's interim pastor, Pastor Jerry Higdon has been serving the Quad Cities as a Pastor since 2004. He is currently pursuing a Doctorate in Ministry Leadership. Pastor Higdon earned an MBA from the University of Phoenix and an undergraduate degree from Western Illinois University and Black Hawk College.

Pastor Higdon retired from John Deere and the Military before he stepped into full-time ministry. He has served at New Hope in Coal Valley, First Congregation (SBC) in Kewanee, and First Baptist in Orion. Pastor Higdon and his wife Amy live in Coal Valley.

Perhaps scripture adds light to the issues created in this current clergy shortage. "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher" (Romans. 10:14-15).
