## David Baraks Receives De Vought Founders Award

David Baraks has been awarded the Henry "Hank" De Vought Founders Award at the Coal Valley Firefighters Appreciation Dinner, held on Saturday, November 8th at Oakwood

Country Club, Coal Valley.

The Henry "Hank" De Vought Founders Award was established and named after a leader and a strong visionary who was truly devoted to the mission of the Coal Valley Fire Protection District with a passion for helping our citizens.

Award recipients are selected by the Board of Trustees that follow the same philosophy and possess the same leadership vision as did Henry "Hank" De Vought, the Coal Valley Fire Protection District's founder. The award is given to a person who has made a significant difference to the District as a whole and their work will be seen for years to come.

In the mid 1960's David Baraks became a rookie volunteer firefighter. In a few years he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. He later took a break to raise his family.

In 1993 David Baraks was appointed to the Board of Trustees by the Rock Island County Board Chairman. In 1995 the voters of the District began electing the Board Trustees and he was elected and re-elected over a 30 year period retiring from service in 2025.

During Mr. Baraks' entire 30 years he served as Board President.

During his time on the Board he was involved with many changes. The major changes included evolving from volunteer ambulance service to contracting full time paramedic level service and eventually in house full time paramedic firefighters. The District also offered contracted Emergency Medical Services to neighboring Fire Protection Districts.

Mr. Baraks was also President when the District expanded and updated the fire station in 2002. During his tenure the apparatus and equipment was upgraded to meet safety requirements and fire fighting efficiency.


David believed that training and education was necessary for both the Board of Trustees and fire fighters. His constant leadership throughout his tenure has given the people of the Coal Valley Fire Protection District safer, better place to live, work, and play.



# **Be Sure To Use Space Heaters Safely This Winter Season**

To use a space heater safely, place it at least 3 feet away from anything that can burn, on a flat, level surface, and never leave it unattended or use it while sleeping.

Always plug it directly into a wall outlet, not an extension cord, and ensure it has safety features like a tip-over switch and a seal of approval from a nationally recognized testing company. Keep water away from electric heaters and place them in high-traffic areas to avoid tripping hazards.

#### Placement and surroundings:

Keep heaters at least 3 feet away from furniture, drapes, bedding, and other combustible items. Place the heater on a solid, flat, and level surface to prevent it from being knocked over. Position the heater out of high-traffic areas to avoid tripping hazards. Never use electric space heaters near water, such as in a bathroom.

#### **Electrical safety:**

Plug the space heater directly into a wall outlet. Do not use an extension cord or power strip, as they can overheat. Ensure the heater is plugged directly into the outlet, not using a multi-outlet surge protector. Periodically check the cord for any damage, such as frayed wires or cracked insulation.

#### **Operation and supervision:**

Turn the space heater off when you leave the room or go to sleep. Never leave it running unattended. Keep children and pets away from the heater and supervise them closely. Do not use space heaters to dry clothes, warm bedding, or cook food.

#### **Purchase and maintenance:**

Buy heaters that are tested and labeled by a nationally recognized testing company like UL (Underwriters Laboratories). Look for a heater with a tip-over safety switch that automatically shuts off the unit if it is knocked over. Always unplug and safely store the heater when it is not in use.

### Village reminds parking rules during snow emergencies

The Village of Coal Valley wishes to remind residents of the importance removing snow from sidewalks and proper snow removal from driveways and other areas.

#### SNOW REMOVAL

All abutting property owners shall be responsible

To remove within a reasonable time from the portion of any public sidewalk abutting said property all snow and ice.

To refrain from putting, pushing, blowing of otherwise depositing any snow removed from a public sidewalk of private property upon any improved public roadway.

For purposes of this Section, "reasonable time" shall mean that snow removal shall be within twenty-four (24) hours after cessation of a snowfall, or, if a snowfall ceases in the nighttime hours, within twenty-four (24) hours after sunrise.

#### PENALTY.

Any person violating the provisions of this Chapter shall be in accordance with Title I Division V Chapter 1 Section 3 of the Code of Ordinance for the Village of Coal Valley for each offense.

# Safety tips to follow this holiday season

As we approach the holiday season, it's time to revisit some safety tips that will minimize your risk of being a victim of a burglary or theft. Criminals will often take the path of least resistance. This reality has led to the concept of target hardening. Please follow some of the following tips to help prevent yourself from becoming a victim.

Almost half of all residential burglaries resulted in thieves gaining entry through unlocked doors or windows. Windows are left opened and unlocked far more often than doors, so make sure you lock them as well. Think about placing an item in the window track to prevent it from being opened from the outside.

- Most burglars enter through back doors or garage doors.
- To keep burglars away from your house or apartment, make their work difficult, risky, and less profitable
  - Use a high quality deadbolt lock on your doors.
- Sliding doors are a favorite with burglars. Entry can be prevented simply by placing a dowel rod in the track.
- Have motion detector lights directed towards doors and windows
- Have interior and exterior lights on timers when not at home. It is inexpensive and provides an illusion that someone is home.
- Trim trees and shrubs near windows and doors so they cannot be used as a hiding place by burglars.
- Take advantage of the home check by completing the patrol check form. You can either stop by or we can email you the form. The information on the form will be kept confidential and will be shredded upon your return. However, the form and service does not relieve the home owner of his/her responsibility to prudent behavior.

#### Going Away on Vacation or for The Weekend?

- Have a neighbor you trust pick up your mail and newspapers or cancel them while you are gone.
- Allow your neighbor to park in your driveway to give the impression that someone is coming and going.
- Make sure you don't leave any signs of going out of town on your answering machine or Facebook<sup>TM</sup>.

Remember burglars go through neighborhoods looking for signs of vacancy. In the evening, they look for darkened houses or lights that have been left off too long. If you see something suspicious, call police right away.

#### **Safety While Shopping**

- Keep packages out of sight, preferably in the trunk where they would be less accessible.
  - Park in well lit areas of the parking lot.
- Hide cell phones and GPS units where they cannot be seen from outside the vehicle. Remove the GPS mount while inside shopping.
  - Consider the purchase of a car alarm.
- Be alert to suspicious activity. If something doesn't look right, it probably isn't.
- Shop with friends, make your shopping experience an event. It's more fun and provides safety in numbers.

#### Village of Coal Valley Water Quality Report Available Online

The Village of Coal Valley water Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), also known as a safe drinking water or water quality report, is an annual report that summarizes the quality of drinking water Coal Valley's community public water systems.

The purpose is to raise customers' awareness of where their drinking water comes from, the quality of their drinking water, what it takes to deliver water to their home and the importance of protecting drinking water sources.

Coal Valley has two separate systems. A majority of the village is served by the report called 2024 CCR – Water Report. The remainder of the Village of Coal Valley located in Henry County near the golf course is served by a report called 2024 CCR - Oak **View Estates Water Report.**
